# Live the Legacy

Greetings! The fall is in full swing and I can attest as things are starting to get busy with committees beginning their community sessions, spring fundraisers being planned, and Boo-tique only a couple weeks away. I am definitely feeling the Active part of being an Active right now. Hopefully, all Actives are busy (not too busy) with their JLWS work and feeling appreciation from our leadership for the hours and hours of dedication.

In previous issues, I have written about the JLWS' habit of developing great leaders. How does that happen? It happens through formal training, experiences, and practice. The JLWS currently offers formal training through GMMs, leadership and committee skills training sessions and will begin offering online independent study training. All of these avenues make us better leaders and more effective trained volunteers.

Even more important than the formal training, the JLWS offers experiences and practice in leadership and community action. The AJLI strategic roadmap proposed that the Junior League is in the business of developing women as civic leaders to impact their community. Every Junior League in every city may have a different focus or issue that they are trying to impact in their community. Here we are focused on impacting children's school success through childhood literacy development and mentoring, and now we are also trying to combat chronic and debilitating diseases in women through exercise and nutrition education. But beyond these local goals, the over arching similarity is that all Junior Leagues are developing women to be civic leaders. We are developing the potential of women to be a living legacy.

Why do we see JLWS members all over town leading efforts, chairing events, running nonprofits and serving on boards? One of the reasons is that they saw it in the JLWS, and it looked easy and like something they could do. Even if she chose not to lead in the JLWS, as a member, she observed how an organization can be run smoothly, efficiently, and organized and it rubbed off on her. She began to realize what is possible and after seeing that, she starts performing good leadership and is able to transfer it to other organizations in her life and in her community.

If you have the privilege to take a role in JLWS leadership, then you also have the ability to practice civic leadership here. In his book, *Outliers: A Story of Success*, Malcolm Gladwell proposes that to achieve specialized greatness, one must practice for ten thousand hours. He uses examples like Bill Gates, the Beatles, athletes and other music prodigies to support this idea, suggesting that hours of practice came before their success. Not to say these stories of success didn't involve brilliant individuals, but when they got to the place to shine, they were additionally prepared due to the hours and hours of practice.

How does that relate to our time as volunteer leaders? We are all serving as leaders regardless of our title or position- the JLWS is growing civic leaders. By spending time working in the many roles throughout the JLWS and the community, our members are growing their skills and practicing for the time when their community really needs them. It may be running a PTA or building a new community center or service. It may be becoming an entrepreneur or achieving national recognition in a professional field. The hours and hours of experience gained through the JLWS will prepare women for leadership roles in the future.

Once again, I ask you to consider how to "Live the Legacy" this year and take advantage of all the JLWS has to offer.

8. Become financially savvy.
9. See mistakes as road signs, not road blocks.
10. Enjoy your work and your life.
11. Give back to keep the cycle of success going.

## Year End Survey Results

Each opinion counts! How often have JLWS members heard that phrase or sentiment recently? If a member has eaten at a restaurant, shopped at a store or even been called on the phone to be asked their opinion on anything from recent shopping and dining experiences to the state of the economy or consumer confidence, she has probably heard, "your opinion counts!" The Junior League of Winston-Salem is no different. In recent years members have been polled on everything from the latest speaker at General Membership Meetings to what issues are important to the membership as it relates to the JLWS's mission and placements. Membership opinion was a key factor in helping to expand the focus areas of youth and children to include women's health. Membership opinion has resulted in changes in policy and procedure such as number of General Membership Meetings, requirements to be able to sustain and even types of placements. The Communications Council uses the findings to help understand the best way to communicate with members and to ascertain satisfaction with using the JLWS Web site for online payments, signups and other communication. Findings from the survey could be used to help solicit sponsorships and spread the word about the JLWS to prospective members.

The most recent year end survey conducted in May 2010 demonstrated a generally satisfied membership.

92 percent of survey respondents would recommend the JLWS to a friend

89 percent felt valued as a member

87 percent felt that their work in the JLWS made a valuable impact on the community

The survey also demonstrated that members prefer direct hands on placement opportunities within the community and also like to use their professional skills to help others in the community. Evenings are preferred over weekends for placements. Concentrated placements are preferred by only 50 percent of those responding to the survey. The Placement Review committee, when determining next year's placements, will use this information along with other data to determine the offerings for next year.

Next time a member sees that link, she should consider taking time out of the day to respond. It's a way to make sure every JLWS members' voice is heard.

## Breakfast with Santa

This year Helping Hands will be supporting the Family Support Network's Breakfast with Santa for families of children with special needs. It will be held on Saturday, December 4, 2010 at Holy Family Catholic Church in Clemmons. Volunteers are needed beginning at 8:30 a.m. with the families arriving between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. Breakfast is provided by the Knights of Columbus while the children circulate the room to play games and make crafts. Each family may have their photo taken with Santa. It is then e-mailed to them. Each child will receive a stocking filled with simple treats like candy, fruit, and small toys. This event allows these children with physical and mental challenges to see Santa in a non-commercial, less crowded situation.

About two hundred kids attend this event annually, so many volunteers are needed Friday afternoon for set-up and Saturday morning for the games and crafts with kids. Look for announcements in the *E-weekly* to sign-up for this project.

**Q:** I am interested in a leadership position. How does the nominating process work?

**A:** The Nominating committee uses several forms when considering nominations. The committee heavily relies on the opinions of members when nominating a leader as well as self-nominations. It is strongly encouraged that JLWS members carefully consider their future membership when submitting nomination forms.

There are several forms used by the Nominating committee: the Leadership Interest form, used for self-nomination and submitted before December 1; the Nominating Straw Ballot, used to nominate others for a position and submitted before December 1; and the Board of Directors Straw Ballot, used to nominate members for Board of Director positions and submitted before June 1.

When considering nominations, the committee carefully considers several characteristics. The Nominating committee prefers to nominate members with prior leadership experience in the JLWS. This enables the member time to learn about the JLWS and develop her skills before taking on a leadership roll. Personality, work style and experience with other organizations is also considered.

The Nominating committee works hard year-round to ensure strong and effective leaders are in place. The committee loves input from members on future leaders for the JLWS, so please consider nominating yourself, a friend or a fellow committee member for a leadership position!

### Meeting the Collaboration Challenge with Vicki Clark

During her visit to Winston-Salem, Vicki Clark lead a community training session entitled “Meeting the Collaboration Challenge: Developing Strategic Alliances Between Nonprofit Organizations and Business.” The session was hosted by the Junior League of Winston-Salem during lunch on September 21. Vicki shared specifics from a workbook that the Peter F. Drucker Foundation had developed to aid nonprofits in establishing joint collaborations with businesses that have similar interests in the community. Vicki encouraged all nonprofits to be mission driven, to understand their mission and to effectively articulate it. Nonprofits should also understand who their customers are, what their customers value, what are the desired results, and what is the plan to reach those outcomes. This knowledge will help all nonprofits to be more effective in accomplishing their mission. Each participant received a workbook which detailed the steps to go through as nonprofits creating productive collaborations with businesses and other nonprofits. A copy of the workbook is available on the JLWS Web site.

Over fifty individuals attended the session, representing twenty-six community agencies’ staff and board members. Some of the agencies represented were Reynolda House, Greenhills School, United Way, Children’s Museum of Winston-Salem, Piedmont Craftsman, SECU Hospitality House, Exchange/SCAN, Family Support Network, Charity Chicks, Winston-Salem Foundation, YWCA, and St. Peter’s World Outreach Center. The JLWS especially appreciates HandsOn Northwest North Carolina for promoting the training through their nonprofit network and Senior Services for providing a great location for the training.

### AJLI Fall Conference

On September 23-25, President Heather Parker and President-Elect Meredith Masten went to Portland, Oregon for the AJLI Fall Conference. This annual event was a wonderful opportunity for these JLWS leaders to receive training, network with other Junior Leagues’ leadership, and participate in governance discussions that will affect the future of the organization.

Meredith and Heather were able to attend a Thursday afternoon meeting of Presidents of Large Leagues (POLL). POLL is an affinity group to which JLWS belongs, and it is a special time for networking regarding Junior Leagues that have similar operating challenges and membership profiles. Thursday night, the Junior League of Portland, celebrating their 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2010, hosted a shopping night out at Nordstrom’s which was very well attended.

The Friday morning session opened with discussion about the AJLI Strategic Plan coming from the Strategic Roadmap design process conducted in 2009-2010. A copy of the proposed AJLI Strategic Plan is available on the JLWS Web site. The morning training session was led by Anne Dalton, chief strategic officer for AJLI, and concerned the rollout of Issue Based Community Impact into individual Junior Leagues through the strategies and tactics that are chosen to create the largest impact on the chosen issue. The afternoon included a governance session focused on AJLI finances. Meredith attended a training on “Communication in a Changing Environment,” and Heather attended “Social Media 101.”

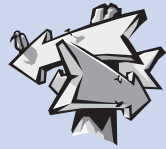

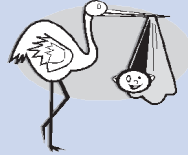
