

Community Baby Shower Placement Announced

The Junior League of Winston-Salem (JLWS) unveiled its newest placement, Community Baby Shower, at the GMM on March 20. The program was launched in 2016 by Fox 8, in partnership with Family Services, and was extremely beneficial to new moms in need throughout the community. Due to the overwhelming response received last year, the program will expand moving forward

in a partnership with the JLWS. Katie Nordeen from Fox 8 and Lucia Higgins, manager of development and community engagement at Family Services, spoke to JLWS members about the program.

Nordeen explained that Community Baby Shower has allowed Fox 8 to live its motto “start local, stay local” through engagement in the community. The idea for the program came to Nordeen while she was in the midst of brainstorming community projects and decorating her own nursery. “Not every mom has the opportunity to purchase things they want for their baby,” Nordeen said. “One out of three children live in poverty in Winston-Salem. We want to ensure that every baby, regardless of status, has access to what they need when they leave the hospital. Last year in Forsyth County, 70 new moms and soon-to-be moms benefitted from Community Baby Shower.”

The program allows pregnant and new moms in the Piedmont Triad to obtain essential items they need to care for their baby in that critical newborn period. Items like formula, wipes, diapers, bottles and toys are all requested. In 2016, Community Baby Shower thrived through a partnership with A Cleaner World, who allowed donated items to be dropped off at locations throughout the community.

Family Services is also critical by helping to identify moms in need who will benefit from support. Candidates are identified by Family Services through their work with Head Start and other programs. Moms also call in to request help. Higgins explained that although the placement is for the 2017-2018 year, help is requested this Spring. As always, JLWS volunteers stepped up to the challenge from Higgins and have picked up items from across the Triad, sorted at Family Services, and will help staff the weekend shopping hours for the new and expectant mothers at the end of May.

A partnership with BookWORM will also help further the reach of Community Baby Shower. BookWORM will give out a book in each care package a new mom receives. “Community Baby Shower really hits home on what our mission and vision is and we are very excited to be its partners in the community,” said Katy Ringeman, JLWS president.

Question:

How does a new placement come into existence?

Answer:

Every year the Placement Review Committee (PRC) meets to discuss in league and community placements. The President-Elect chairs the committee along with President, Strategic Planning Officer, Nominating Chair, Placement Liaison Chair and Community AVP. Community placements are up for review every two years. During that time, we accept new applications, discuss current placements and ask if they are they still working for our membership and is the partner happy with the volunteer manpower we are able to provide.

This year was a community review year – we welcomed READWS and Community Baby Shower and sadly said goodbye to Girls on the Run and Brenner Children’s Family Meals Made Easy. We also changed Crosby Scholars to be a Sustainer project. JLWS Headquarters Update

One of the objectives on the annual plan for 2016-2017 was to examine the location of the JLWS headquarters and to make a recommendation to the Board of Directors on what and where the headquarters should be in the future.

The Headquarter's Ad Hoc Committee was comprised of Katy Ringeman, Aimee Rowe, Cat New, Jennifer Baker, Walker Jones, Liz Noland, Shannon Rainey, Loy McGill, Cindy Christopher and Jackie Piscetelli. The group met multiple times throughout the Junior League year and examined prospective properties, reviewed the budget, polled the new member, active and sustaining membership, and evaluated the objectives on the strategic plan to confirm potential locations were in line with future projects.

The Committee made a recommendation to the Board of Directors to continue to rent the existing headquarter space for an additional year, which would allow for a smooth transition during the summer of the Junior League year and for time to budget appropriately for anticipated build-out and moving expenses.

By waiting an additional year to move, the Board of Directors will be able to evaluate the amount of space needed for a thriving and inviting headquarters. As a budgetary action and trial run, the BookWORM Wormhole was moved into headquarters in time for the 2017 Spring book drive. The Ad Hoc Committee will continue under the leadership of Aimee and Cat.

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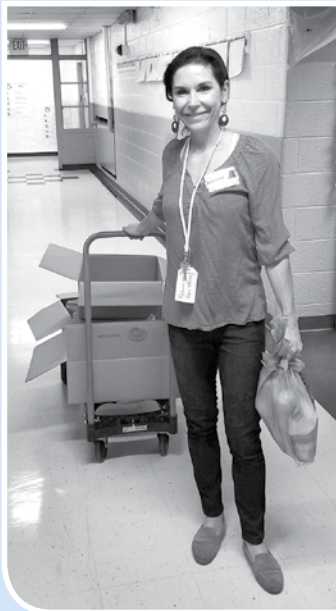

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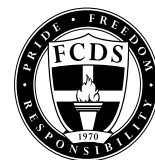

Investing your Way: February Lunch and Learn

Junior League members are getting smart about their financial future! On February 22, members gathered at Headquarters for a Lunch and Learn opportunity called Investing your Way. Led by experienced investment professionals Brent Downing, Regional Vice President with Hartford Funds, and Joel D. Ayers, Investment Counselor with BB&T Investments, the group learned about the unique opportunities and challenges that women face when making financial decisions.

Among the reasons for optimism, women are typically better investors than men in three ways:

1. They tend to focus on long-term goals.
2. They are more likely to ask for directions.

3. They take more time making informed investment decisions.

Women overall still earn less than men, they reach their peak income at an earlier age (39 years old compared to 48 years old for men), and they spend less time in the workforce due to caregiving responsibilities for children and aging parents. When planning for retirement, women also should expect to live independently, meaning the savings they establish during their working years must last longer.

Strategies women should consider include meeting with an investment advisor to plan and prioritize goals, monitoring your budget (even the small expenses can add up over the month!), and avoiding reacting to short-term trends in the market.

Following the presentation, members engaged in a helpful Q&A where they asked for advice on their personal situations, including setting up college funds for young children and having financial conversations prior to marriage.

The session was organized by the Volunteer Development committee as part of our initiative to offer educational opportunities benefiting our membership. 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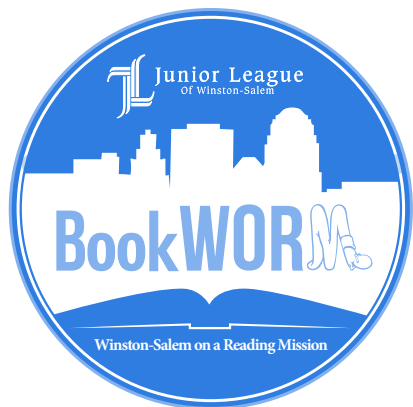

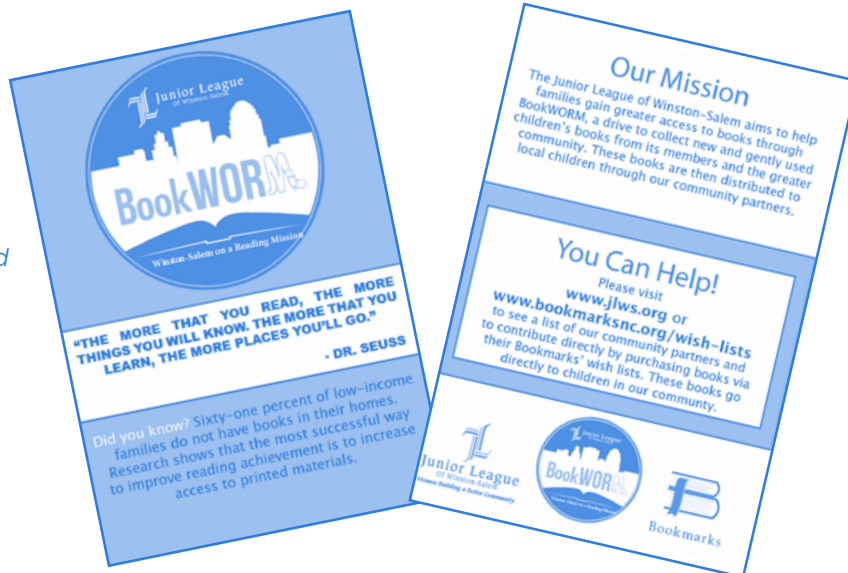


2016-2017 BookWORM Accomplishments

- Teamed up with Bookmarks (a local non-profit that JLWS helped start) for our fall drive
- Wishlists were available for JLWS and community members to use by purchasing a book that went directly to community partners
- Continued to have community partners “shop” our books (ReadWS, Smart Start, Imprints, El Buen Pastor, Amos Cottage)
- In 2017, we added new community partners: Forsyth Connects, Family Services (Fox 8 Baby Shower) as a means of expanding book distribution in the area.
- We gave 1,500 books to the Community Reading Room at Philo Hill middle school (in honor of Rodney Ellis) and 2,000 books to Easton, Forest Park, Kimberly Park, Cook Elementary Schools (all Title 1).
- The membership collected thousands of books.

Thanks to all JLWS members for your efforts in another successful Spring Drive!

In April 2017 BookWORM moved into JLWS headquarters. This has led to a cost-savings for the Junior League, greater efficiency and improved accessibility for membership and community partners to donate and collect books, respectively.



A BookWORM Success Story:

There is no doubt that BookWORM’s free books have impacted our students. Many of them have no books at home and the only books they read are books they check out from the library. So when a student picks out a BookWORM book and I tell him he can take it home and keep it at home, his eyes light up in disbelief and this exchange follows:

“I can keep it?”
Yes.
“Keep it in my house?”
Yes.

Our kids are so happy to have books they can call their own. Some of them still think it is too good to be true. So they bring it back to the library to turn it in. Usually, I take a marker and write their name on the book and say, “Now it’s yours; don’t bring it back to the library’. You should see the wide smile on their faces.

Full Hearts

Emily Saunders, chair of the Backpack Program, spoke in the second session of the March 20 GMM. She explained the purpose of the program is to feed chronically hungry school children in

the local school system, which for the Junior League of Winston-Salem is Cook Elementary School.

Members of the Backpack Program placement are responsible for going to Cook Elementary school at 9:30 a.m. each Friday and packing up and distributing food to the students, which are put in the children's backpacks by their teachers.

The food comes from Second Harvest Food bank, and the members distribute the food into bags which are then delivered to classrooms. Each bag contains two cereals, two milks, two juices, two cans of meat and two fruit or applesauce. They are currently delivering to around 90 children per week. Each member of the committee fulfills one Friday a month.

Saunders explained how dire the need is for this program as each child enrolled at Cook Elementary receives free breakfast and lunch. Recently the school was known as the lowest performing school in all of North Carolina. By providing sustenance, those children are better able to concentrate, learn and have their nutritional needs met.

While the children certainly benefit from the program, Saunders emphasized the committees' fulfillment. When the children see the bags being delivered, they wave and are excited, often approaching members and thanking them. Saunders encouraged members to look into the placement and see for themselves what joy is found in the community from the Junior League of Winston-Salem's actions.



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Spotlight on The Dames of the Dow investment club founded by Junior League of Winston-Salem members

The Dames of the Dow, a Winston Salem investment club, was featured in the January/February issue of Better Investing Magazine (the monthly publication of the National Association of Investors Corporation). Author Daniel J. Boyle, CFA, said, “I was struck by the strong organization and operating methods of the club and how members keep track of a large, 22-stock portfolio.”

The club was formed by 13 members of the Junior League of Winston-Salem in 1998. The Junior League helped start several investment clubs after reading about the Beardstown Ladies. In 2003, another club disbanded and several of their members joined the Dames. Today the club has 12 members, four of whom are original. The majority of today’s members are JLWS Sustainers, and original members make up a third of the group.

President Alice Ficken says, “when Beth (Einstein, Vice President) and I spoke with Dan Boyle, we realized that it was our Junior League training that has helped make our club so strong and successful for nearly twenty years. Dan has interviewed and written about many clubs through the years, and he mentioned numerous times that he was most impressed by our structure, by-laws and discipline – all of which we attribute to our Junior League experience.”
