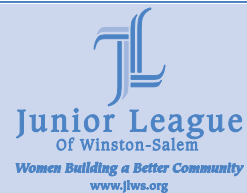

Board Briefs

The Junior League of Winston-Salem Board of Directors met on October 18, 2010. Heather Wells presented the financial report by reviewing the profit/loss statement and current balance sheet. Heather Parker presented the proposed agenda, questions, and training for the Town Hall Meetings scheduled for November 2010.

Eva Wu presented a summary of the Community Impact models for current community placements as well as their HR/economic viability summary. Eva Wu presented research from Long Range Planning concerning a women's health public awareness campaign. Cornelia Groce provided an update on SPAC and current advocacy efforts with Public Affairs Committee. Laura Wilkerson shared the Placement Liaison training plan, and Shelley Holden shared the plans for training membership on the nominating process.

The Board of Directors approved the following bylaws changes which will be brought to full membership for approval at the January General Membership Meeting:

- Proposed change to Article III Membership, Section 4. Membership to remove references to in good standing as a restriction to proposing a new member.
- Proposed change to Article III Membership, Section 5. Privileges of Membership to remove references to in good standing as a restriction to members who can submit for transfers, inter-league memberships, and non-resident membership.
- Proposed amendment to Article III Membership, Section 6. Resignations, Removals, and Reinstatements to allow reinstatement to all resigned members upon request by paying a reinstatement fee and interim dues as specified in the JLWS policies.

The Board of Directors:


- Approved motion to change Membership Policies to remove reference to good standing from the age and years of service requirements to become a sustainer, from the proposal of member eligibility, from the requests for transfers, from the conditions of resignation and the eligibility to reinstate membership, from the resignation when removal occurs, and from the eligibility for maternity leave, emergency leave, and sabbaticals.
- Approved motion to change Standing Committee Policies, V. Membership Review Committee to remove reference to in good standing from the removal or resignation recommendations sent to the Board from the MRC.
- Approved motion to change Placement Policies II. to remove reference to in good standing as to eligibility to apply for a special placement.
- Approved motion to change Rummage Sale Policies, III. Changes in Membership Status and IV. Fines to remove reference to in good standing.
- Approved motion to change Standing Committee Policies, VI. Nominating Committee, C. Eligibility to Serve on Nominating Committee to specify that members on the Nominating Committee will not be allowed to double place on another JLWS placement during their year on the Nominating Committee.

The Junior League of Winston-Salem Board of Directors met on November 15, 2010. Heather Wells presented the financial report by reviewing the profit/loss statement and balance sheet. BB&T has agreed to sponsor the Rummage Sale Preview Party. The Board of Directors reviewed the annual plan action items regarding proposed placements for 2011-2012, the JLWS Community Calendar and Publications Review. The Board encouraged all members to attend the upcoming League Linker events.

The Board of Directors:

- Approved motion to change Finance Council Non-Budgeted Spending Limits. Spending of up to \$250 can be approved by the Finance VP; over \$250 and up to \$2,500 can be approved by the Finance Council; over \$2,500 and up to \$5,000 will need to be approved by the Finance Council and the Board of Directors; over \$5,000 will need to be approved by the Finance Council, the Board of Directors and the Membership.

Bylaw Changes

In September 2010, a Membership ad hoc committee was formed to review the JLWS Membership Bylaws and Policies. The committee reviewed the Categories of Membership, Resignations, Removals and Reinstatements and Leaves and Sabbaticals. The committee made recommendations to the Membership Council to change the JLWS Bylaws and Policies regarding Membership in “good standing”, by removing the terms “good standing” from the bylaws and policies. The rationale for removing this wording is that the Association of Junior Leagues International has three categories of membership: Provisional, Active and Sustainer and does not distinguish between good standing, loss of good standing or not good standing, therefore the JLWS will no longer distinguish membership status as such. The JLWS also desires to be flexible in meeting members’ needs as life situations and changes occur.

The current Bylaws and Policies state “failure to fulfill the placement, fundraising or financial requirements of membership as specified in the JLWS Polices shall result in a loss of good standing.” If a member does not fulfill these requirements, the Board of Directors may remove the member from the JLWS in “not good standing.” Historically, a member resigned from the JLWS in “not good standing” is not able to reinstate in the JLWS or other Junior Leagues in the future. It is the Board of Directors and Membership Council’s desire for our members to have flexibility and options within the JLWS. It is the hope of the Board of Directors that those members, who may have been removed in this manner in the past would have the opportunity to be welcomed back into the JLWS. In the same way, when life changes occur for our current members and a leave is needed, she can return to a welcoming community of women ready to work side by side, Living the Legacy of the JLWS and leaving a legacy in the Winston-Salem community.

At the October Board meeting, the Membership Council presented fourteen Motions for Bylaw and Policy changes removing the terms “good standing, loss of good standing and not good standing,” from these bylaws and polices. The motions were passed by the Board on October 18, 2010. Please see the October Board Briefs for specific bylaws and polices effected. In addition, Membership policy IV, B Reinstatements, was amended to add “One reinstatement in the JLWS may be granted per member.”

JLWS Bylaw Article XI-Amendments, states “the Bylaws may be amended or rescinded by a two-thirds majority of the votes cast at any designated voting meeting.” Therefore, the Bylaw changes removing the terms “in good standing” will be voted for approval by the membership on January 24, 2011 at the General Membership Meeting.

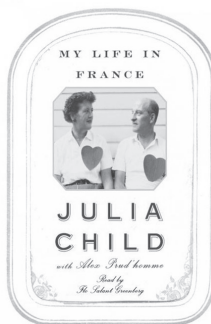

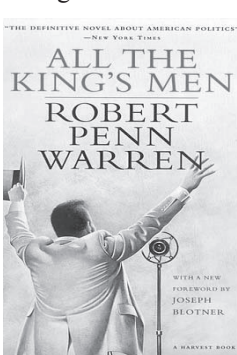

A recent study showed that in middle income neighborhoods, the ratio of books per child is thirteen to one.

The same study showed that in low-income neighborhoods, the ratio is one age-appropriate book for every three-hundred children!

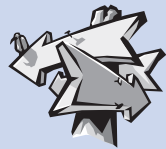
